SEFF's Advocacy Service

The Advocacy Service is a provision that has been created to help support the needs of victims and survivors. Matthew and I continue to work on the following aspects of the service:-

• Displacement – research will only reveal some characteristics, i.e. church records, census, etc. We need more input from the members, some of you have been forthcoming but there is much more information out there which

we are not privy to. Please remember people did not only move because of direct attacks, there were often more sinister facets to these occurrences. People may have moved because of constant harassment by neighbours, covert incidents, constant damage to property, attacks on their neighbours that left people feeling vulnerable, isolation due to family unable to visit because of security risks, etc. Please contact us at any time with anything that you deem may be of assistance to us.

- Border Trails The border trails are virtually complete, if anyone has a particular knowledge of North, South or West Fermanagh, or Enniskillen, and would be prepared to assist in the narration of the accounts to visitors and groups, please advise us.
- Support to individuals who have outstanding issues with all government agencies, including the PSNI, PONI, the AGS, the Garda Ombudsman, etc.

I recently paid a visit to the PSNI Station in Enniskillen and made enquiries in relation to outstanding unsolved cases. It is remarkable to note that during my visit I learned that the PSNI are considering taking all detectives out of Fermanagh. If you wish to question what, if anything, the PSNI are doing in relation to an unsolved murder or other serious crime, you must write to:-

If you wish me to conduct this enquiry on your behalf, please advise, and I will happily oblige. There is some suggestion that the structures proposed by the Stormont House Agreement are nowhere near implementation. If this is the case, the new legacy investigations unit, HIU, is some way off being formed. We therefore must continue to agitate, and conduct our own investigations, as it is extremely difficult to force the PSNI to do anything without a level of coercion.

Agents, Informers - Heroes or Criminals?

The question we have to consider is the effect Government paid agents within loyalism and republicanism had on the ending of the Troubles. The allegations in Spotlight recently have once more brings their involvement to the fore. It is now apparent that both sets of organisations were riddled with informers, some at the very highest level, Denis Donaldson being a prime example. I have no doubt others will be exposed in the future, and will continue to heap embarrassment on those organisations. The Chief Constable hinted at this recently when he indicated that if PSNI HQ open their vaults, they may reveal some 'unpalatable truths'. We should actually consider that these agents, as objectionable as they may be to some people, may have brought the Troubles to an end quicker than expected. It is not unreasonable to suggest that without the use of these agents, the murders and violence would have continued. However, we cannot ignore the possibility that there have been agents who have stepped outside the parameters of their 'contracts' whether to save their own life or otherwise, or at times they have been given freedom that has resulted in innocent deaths. It has been indicated in Spotlight that Mr Donaldson was 'working both sides.'

These 'unpalatable truths' referred to by Mr Hamilton may also reveal documents indicating the involvement of others in serious crime. The allegations directed towards Gerry Adams continue apace - withholding information, perverting the course of justice, murder, conspiracy to murder, kidnapping, et al. May I suggest that if any other citizen within this country had the same level of accusations directed against them, they would have either resigned from public office or at least have been forced to resign by their party or employer. Sinn Fein are blind to the effect this man is having on the attempts of this society to recover from the past, and he is not alone. The Stormont Assembly and business conducted there will be tainted by the involvement of other figures like Adams. Until these figures exit the stage, we will become bogged down by constant exposés that cause unrest, distrust and bad feeling. Jim Wilson, speaking on Talkback, tried to defend the 'undefendable', justifying a mural to a loyalist murderer. Sorry, Mr Wilson, but this man represented is no different to the Shankill bomber, whose coffin was carried by Mr Adams. They were all, loyalist and republican murderers and gangsters, the problem, not the solution. They were the scourge of their societies, and created the mayhem we are trying to fix. In the middle of all this, the innocent victims of terrorism are forgotten about once more. Vast sums of money continue to flow in the direction of ex-prisoner groups under the guise of resettlement, conflict resolution, etc, whilst innocent victims have to 'kowtow' with their begging bowls, with a level of genuflection that is at times demeaning.

As the years progress post 1998, the revisionist policy of Irish Republicanism attempts to airbrush the role of the IRA by constant allegations against the British role in Northern Ireland. The simple statistics state that violent Irish Republicans (the major player being the PIRA) murdered 60% of all victims during the Troubles, and Loyalists murdered 30%. These statistics do not sit well and their policy is to change those figures by widespread accusations against the state. In a recent debate a gentleman replied to me that the figures should be 60-40 (40% Security Forces) implying that all Loyalist murders were inspired by the state. He further added that the 60% will be eroded as many

of those murders also had state involvement. The underlying strategy is that the Sinn Fein version of history will not be as we know it, the IRA will become victims, not perpetrators; everyone else was to blame. Their strategy has many tentacles - using victims, constant fabricated allegations, false promises, demands for public inquiries, using prominent law firms to pursue their cases, etc. Is Gerry Adams a victim of Government 'securocrats', constantly being harassed and undermined, or maybe he has a case to answer?

SEFF's Annual Remembrance & Thanksgiving Service

<u>'Carrying forward the Torch of Remembrance'</u>

In a packed Church in north Fermanagh, Colaghty Church of Ireland, Lack in excess of 300 people came along recently to attend SEFF's fourth Annual Service of Remembrance and Thanksgiving. The theme of this year's Service was; 'Carrying forward the Torch of Remembrance.'

The theme very much connected with the content of the Service where young people played a central and pivotal role. SEFF's new youth choir comprised of young people whose loved ones were murdered through terrorism sang their debut performance, young people also relayed Bible readings, assisted in performing the roles of ushers and of collectors.

In a statement, Director of Services at SEFF Kenny Donaldson stated: "We were overwhelmed by the support we received for the Service where people came along in their droves to show solidarity with the innocent victims and survivors of terrorism.

Within the Service content were a number of special elements including the dedication of six new Memorial Quilt patches to, Const Stephen Carroll, Const Ronan Kerr, Const David Black, Mary Travers, William Heenan and Sgt John Eaglesham".

"We also focused on three local murders which were committed within the Parish and adjacent area and which had such a profound effect upon the families concerned and indeed the wider community. Jillian Johnston, Ronald Funston and Jim Oldman. Family representatives of these three local people contributed testimony, a Bible reading and prayers".

"The Service brought together people from a wide cross section of the community. There were also people present from Great Britain and The Republic of Ireland. The commonality all present shared was their opposition to terrorism and criminal violence being used (Present or Past) in the pursuance of or defence of a political objective.

"We extend a warm thanks to all those involved in making the Service so special and in particular Rev Alan Irwin and his Parish Vestry (who himself is an innocent victim/survivor of terrorism through having had his own father Thomas and uncle Frederick murdered) Rev Alan's message was a message of resilience, of the need to continue the pursuit of justice, truth and accountability and it was delivered in a wonderful spirit of Christian HOPE," concluded Mr Donaldson.
